Spanish Language Placement Exams Information for New Students

Welcome to Columbia! You can take our **online** Spanish language placement examinations any time from <u>this webpage</u>. You must take a placement exam before registering for a course or before placing your name on a waiting list. You can take Columbia and Barnard Spanish language courses.

Which placement exam should I take? If you have been exposed to Spanish to some (even to a very small) extent at home or in your community from an early age, please take the Spanish as a Heritage Language Placement Exam described below. All other students, please take the Spanish as a Second Language Placement Exam described below.

Spanish as a Second Language Placement Exam

Part I: The Spanish as a Second Language Placement Exam consists of multiple-choice questions about vocabulary, grammar, and reading comprehension. There are **no** speaking, listening, or writing components on the exam. When you finish the exam, you will immediately receive your score <u>and</u> the Spanish language course to take. Additional information is available on our website.

Part II: If you score **above 625** on Part I, you qualify for a possible exemption from the language requirement. The second exam, which has the **same format as Part I**, will be offered in-person in Columbia's <u>Language Resource Center</u> located in Room 352 of the International Affairs Building during the New Student Orientation Program (NSOP). Please complete <u>this online form</u> to register for Part II using your Columbia email address and authenticating with <u>Columbia's Duo Multifactor authentication (MFA)</u>, preferably by Wednesday, August 23rd.

Spanish as a Heritage Language Placement Exam

Please take this exam if you have been exposed to Spanish to some (even to a very small) extent at home or in your community from an early age; otherwise please take the Spanish as a Second Language Placement Exam described above.

Part I: The Spanish as a Heritage Language Placement Exam consists of writing as well as multiple choice and fill-in the blank items about your exposure to the language, grammar, vocabulary, and reading comprehension. There is a short listening/dictation section but there is no speaking section. Dr. Francisca Aguiló-Mora will contact you with your score, level, course, or notify you if you qualify for possible exemption by competing Part II, described below.

Part II: If your score on Part I of the heritage exam qualifies you for a possible exemption, <u>Dr. Lee B. Abraham</u> will contact you to schedule Part II, which consists of writing and an oral component.

The two Spanish as a Heritage Language courses are as follows*:

- 1) Spanish UN 1108 Elementary Spanish for Heritage Speakers
- 2) Spanish UN 2108 Intermediate Spanish for Heritage Speakers
